Prologue – Genesis 1-11 (Man Can't Save Himself!)

- Patriarchs: Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph (c. 200 Years)
- 2 Egyptian Bondage/Slavery (400 Years)
- Moses & the Exodus (c.1450 BC)
- Desert "Honeymoon," Failure to Enter the Promise Land & 40 Years of Desert Wandering
- So Joshua & Taking Possession of the Promise Land: Radical Obedience ► Victory & Blessing
- ⑤ Judges: Spiritual Compromise ► Chaos, Curse & Defeat (c. 300 Years)
- **②** United Kingdom: Saul (40) + David (40) + Solomon (40) = 120 Years
- 3 Divided Kingdom: Rehoboam (Judah) & Jeroboam I (Israel)
- Fall of the 10 Northern Tribes of Israel to the Assyrians (722 BC)

FROM HEZEKIAH TO MALACHI / THE END OF THE OLD TESTAMENT

Lesson #1: God's warning signs are <u>acts</u> of <u>mercy</u> & we should <u>heed</u> them.
Very <u>quickly</u> .
Lesson #3: You are not simply a <u>product</u> of your <u>past</u> .
Lesson #4: There is a <u>limit</u> to God's <u>patience</u> .
► Lesson #5: Just because God's people <u>blow</u> it does not mean that God is <u>dead</u> .
Lesson #6: <u>Satan</u> will do his best to try to <u>Stop</u> or <u>impede</u> the <u>work</u> of <u>God</u> .
Lesson #7: God always <u>keeps</u> His <u>promises</u> !

- 4. Unlike Hezekiah who walked with the Lord, his son Manasseh revolted from his good example. According to 2 Kings 21:1-9 what specific evil did he do?

5. Read 2 Kings 22:1-2, 8-13: 23:1-3. The final good king in Judah was Josiah. What impact did the Word of God have on him, and what did he do to be sure the people heard it?

- 6. Read 2 Timothy 2:15. Thinking about the example of Josiah, what challenge does this passage give to us today?
- 7. Briefly describe four of the many reforms Josiah made in Judah according to the following verses. How does removing negative cultural influences affect us inwardly?
